Dear FUMC,

January was a busy month for me! I am grateful to the Mutual Ministry Team for giving me a little extra support this month to allow me the time I needed to get through the first half of my Local Pastor Licensing School.

The first part of Licensing School was held as an intensive week of classes at Rolling Ridge Retreat Center in North Andover, MA. I arrived there at 5pm on Sunday, January 8th and spent my days in class from 7am until 8pm each day until Friday, January 13th. There was a lot to cover and not a lot of time to cover it, and while I expected to be completely exhausted and burnt out by the end of it, I left feeling refreshed and renewed.

I felt renewed because I could feel the presence of the Holy Spirit moving in the Church. It seems that the patterns of life can always be boiled down into three simple words: **O**rder, **D**isorder, and **R**eorder. Repeatedly, we see this pattern emerge. We see it in the natural world as we move through the seasons. We see it in our own personal, psychological development. We see it in the day to day tasks that we do around the house or in the garden. Inevitably, the order, the routine, what we've come to know of life is deconstructed, disordered, thrown into turmoil, or dies. And whether we're aware, or around to witness it or not, a restructuring, a reordering, or a resurrection, if you will, takes place.

I think it's been easy for me to focus on the deconstruction, the splintering, and disorder in our denomination over the past few years as we've heard of declining membership and an impending split in the church over the inclusion of our LGBTQ+ siblings. Focusing on the disorder can lead to a lot of anxiety, immobility, and fear. But our faith teaches us to look toward the resurrection. "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, and faithful in prayer," Paul tells us (Romans 12:12). And I felt like my time at Licensing School helped to open my eyes to many of the ways God is resurrecting our church, reordering our church, and making all things new.

I hope that you will join me this Lent in search of the spiritual renewal that comes from being joyful in hope, patient in our afflictions, and faithful in prayer. In this newsletter, you'll read about some of the ways we can be on that journey together. Please always reach out if you would like to meet and talk about where the Spirit of God is moving in your own life.

YOU are the CHURCH!

And your unique gifts are needed!

We are currently in need of people to fill the following roles:

USHERS and GREETERS

Ushers and Greeters stand at the entryways to welcome church members and guests to worship, hand out church bulletins, and direct people to where they need to be. Additional responsibilities could include helping pass the offertory plate during worship or aiding in other logistical procedures during worship.

SUNDAY OPENERS and CLOSERS

Sunday **Openers** are responsible for arrive at the church early (by 8:30am) to turn on the lights, unlock the doors, make sure the heating/AC is on, sound system is on, microphone batteries are charged, and the space is ready for worship.

Closers (could be the same person) go through this checklist in reverse.

COUNTERS (Sunday Offering)

The counters count the money from the Sunday offering, create a report for the Financial Secretary, and make the deposit at Westfield Bank. This is ideally done on Sundays after church.

TREASURER

Our current Treasurer, Sally J. Templeton, will be retiring from her position at the end of March. We are looking for someone to take her place. The job involves about 2-3 hours per week, for which a stipend is given. Weekly duties involve book-keeping and check writing. Monthly duties include payroll and taxes, bank reconciliations, and creating a finance report for the One Committee. The treasurer serves on the One Committee. A full job description and training is available.

ALL CHURCH CLEAN UP February 19th after Church

We will be having a Cleaning Day after church on Sunday, February 19th. We'll break into teams and be sorting through old furniture and items that need to be discarded, sprucing up various corners and crevices, and making the church look polished and ready for Easter. Wear your cleaning clothes to church.

We'll be providing pizza for everyone who stays to help out!

Wall for Missions

The United Methodist Church identifies itself as a connectional church. This means that our ministry doesn't stop in our local community, but rather we are part of a global network of churches doing ministry across the world. This is possible through the United Methodist Church's giving structure. You may have heard the term "Apportionment" or "Mission Shares" before. This term refers to the amount of money our local church is responsible to pay toward our global missions. This money pays for things like the Black College Fund and Africa University, supporting our Conference's campus, youth, and retreat ministries, and the salary of our District Superintendent, the health benefits for retired pastors, and funding for the Board of Ordained Ministry.



Over the past several years, FUMC has not been able to pay our full mission shares, though we try to pay the minimum, which is required and accumulates a balance if not paid. For 2023, our total mission shares are \$17,521.00. The One Committee included the minimum amount of \$9,401.00 in the approved budget, but even with that, we are facing a budget deficit this year of -\$14,409.15.

I believe that paying our mission shares, and participating in the connectional ministry of the United Methodist Church is an important part of our spiritual life as a church. Because of that, I'm challenging FUMC to raise approximately \$10,000 this year to put toward our mission shares. To accomplish this, I've asked Melanie and Kelsey Collis to help me create a Wall for Missions. Here's how it will work:

The wall will display 144 envelopes, each marked \$1 through \$144. Over the course of the next 11 months, you are encouraged to take an envelope off the wall, fill it with the amount shown, and return it in the offering. If we can fill all 144 envelopes, we'll have paid our minimum Mission Share amount AND almost completely close our deficit!

Maybe you have an extra couple of dollars in your wallet one week and want to fill the \$2 envelope – Awesome! Or maybe you have a little extra to give and can fill the \$125 envelope one month – that's great! Or perhaps you and your kids would like to do a fundraiser, set up a lemonade stand, or do a bake sale and all of the proceeds can go toward filling as many envelopes as you can – amazing things can happen when we're creative!

I know it's not always fun to hear about money, budget deficits, and fundraising, but I encourage you to view this not as an ask for money, but a call to ministry and a revival of our Wesleyan, Methodist, Connectional roots. An opportunity to see that we can really make an impact in the world.

On the next page, I've provided the full outline of how our FUMC's mission shares are put into action. The first \$9,401.00 from our Wall for Missions will go toward Fund III: Ministry Support. That is the fund that holds its balance to the next year if not paid, and which is included in our budget. Fund II and Fund I are the next levels of giving, which reach out even further. Maybe we won't be able to reach those goals this year, and that's okay, but I thought it would be important for you to see how the United Methodist Church is working in New England and abroad. 
Early Risers Discussion Group PROPHETIC WORDS
